RE: FOUNTAIN INN FIRE SERVICE AREA

Honorable Chairman Taylor, Honorable Vice Chairman Kirven and Greenville County Council:

In 2007, the City of Fountain Inn (the "City") and Greenville County (the "County") executed an Agreement (the "Agreement") for the Fountain Inn Fire Department (the "Department") to continue providing fire service within the Fountain Inn Fire Service Area (the "FSA"). As you are aware, the City is entering the eighth year of the implementation of it Capital Improvement Plan to serve the FSA (the "CIP").

In order to fund the CIP and staff the Fire Department within the FSA, it was projected that additional millage increases would be required.

Eight years ago, the City endorsed and provided you with a ten-year Capital Improvement Program (the "CIP"), which included a comprehensive spreadsheet detailing associated capital and operational costs. We have attached an update of ten-year revenue and expense model, including capital improvements, which is a continuation of previous years' presentations.

The City, by contract with the County, has been providing fire service in the FSA for over 25 years. In 2014 ISO ratings in the FSA went from an ISO 5 to an ISO 4 in the City and a split ISO 5/9 in the County portion of the FSA to an ISO 4/4Y. ISO is moving to a system whereby there will be a single ISO rating for the City and the FSA area. The City believes the addition of three new firefighters in FY16 and three more in FY18, will result in a stronger ISO rating. There is already evidence that insurance rates have been lowered for those citizens located within five miles of the recently opened sub-station #2.

As you may recall from the City's first presentation in 2007 (for FY08), additional firefighters were projected once sub-station #2 was completed. In an effort to improve response time on the east side of our fire service area we have contracted with Clear Spring Fire Department to share their East Georgia Road Station. Last year the City hired three firefighters to help man Clear Spring FD. While the City has been able to add three additional firefighters, three additional dispatchers, two engines, SCBA's and a vehicle to support the FSA, continued growth requires the need for additional firefighters in the near future. We request funding to assist in hiring three additional firefighters. In order to fund these operational needs, we request a 15.1% operational millage increase (maximum CPI + population under the three-year look back + current year millage caps pursuant to Statute).

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We ask that you once again consider the following:

- Fountain Inn Fire Service Area is continuing to experience growth.
- The County portion of the FSA covers 24.7 square miles and the City portion of the FSA covers 10 square miles.
- Response time has been reduced by approximately two minutes in certain portions of the FSA because of the addition of sub-station #2, personnel at Clear Spring FD, and the capital and personnel investment over the past eight years.
- The *most important reason* for these improvements is that lives will be saved and our firefighters will experience significant improvement in their personal safety.

The current millage for the Fountain Inn FSA is 32.7 mils, which includes 26.1 mills for operations and 6.6 mills for debt service. The City is requesting for the FSA a 15.1% millage increase for operations, which equates to a 3.94 mill increase. In addition, in order to provide funding for the FSA Capital Improvement Program through 2018, we request an additional 1.05 mills for debt service. Such combined 4.99 mills increase for operations and debt would equate to approximately \$19.99/\$100,000 home (or \$1.67/month).

Please review the attached information, which includes the Resolution adopted by City Council on April 9, 2015, in support of the ten-year CIP; the financial model including the Capital Improvement Program; and the millage request application. Please let us know if you have any questions. Thank you very much for your continued support and consideration of the FY2016 Agreement for the FSA.

A RESOLUTION TO APPROVE AND ADOPT A TEN YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR THE FOUNTAIN INN FIRE SERVICE AREA, GREENVILLE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, the City of Fountain Inn (the "City") has a contract with Greenville County (the "County") to provide fire suppression and other fire protection related services to county residents residing outside the City limits (the "Fire Service Area"); and

WHEREAS, in order to provide the required services to meet the requirements of the contract and to meet the fire protection needs to the residents of the Fire Service Area certain capital improvements (the "Capital Improvement Program") must be undertaken; and

WHEREAS, proper planning and management for the provision of fire services in the Fire Service Area requires a long range, ten year plan to keep up with and adequately respond to the growth and demand for service in the area; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the City Council, the Fountain Inn Fire Chief and the City Administrator that not only is the Capital Improvement Program necessary to adequately serve the needs of the residents of the Fire Service Area, but if implemented, will greatly enhance the level of those services; and

WHEREAS, the City provides a full time, professionally trained staff of firefighters who continue to undergo rigorous additional training to be ready and skilled in fighting fires, saving lives and protecting property; and

WHEREAS, it is the further finding of the City that the implementation of the Capital Improvement Plan will result in:

- Reduced response times for calls for service;
- Reduced ISO ratings resulting in potential savings in homeowner's insurance premiums;
- Enhanced fire protection services being provided throughout the Fire Service Area; and
- The real potential for saving lives and increasing safety for firefighters.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Fountain Inn City Council hereby approves the Capital Improvement Plan for the Fire Service Area that is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the City Administrator design and carry forward a plan to implement the Capital Improvement Program and to seek adequate financing from Greenville County to fund the program.

- Describe any business or structure which requires special equipment or represent potentially dangerous calls.
 - -Nicca: contains large quantities of acid based products that are highly flammable as well as organic solvents which are highly flammable.
 - -Ameri-Pak: manufacture and store large quantities of plastics. Also contain large silos of plastic pellets which have the potential of an engulfment hazard.
 - -AVX: manufacturer of electronic capacitors which have the capabilities to store electric energy. This building also has areas that can only be accessed via an aerial apparatus.
 - -Holly Oak Chemical: supplier of large quantities of solvent based chemicals. This business also has multiple buildings that will require and aerial apparatus.
 - -Riches Bakery: contains large quantities of Ammonia gas. This building also has need of an aerial apparatus to be able to gain access.
 - -Faurecia: This is a plastic injection molding facility that requires us to need our aerial apparatus to gain access to the roof which contains exhaust stacks which catch fire.
 - -Grainger: a facility that contains and ships a variety of merchandise from solvents to petroleum based products. This facility is also over 1 Million sqft and would require an aerial apparatus.
 - -Fisher Barton: contains salt vats which are heated. These are highly corrosive and hazardous to human health.
 - -Williams Pipeline: this is a large supplier of Natural Gas.
 - -Two (2) Cellular Phone Towers: this would require an aerial apparatus.
 - -Four (4) Water Towers: this would require an aerial apparatus.
 - -Rail Road: there is a railway that carries various merchandise through the center of Fountain Inn. There are also times were petroleum products travel via the railway i.e.... E85, etc...
 - -Colonial Pipeline: this is the largest supplier of both petroleum and diesel on the east coast. There are multiple transfer or boost stations inside our district.
 - -Gen III: contains large quantities of flammable gasses used for welding. This business is also close to residential homes.

-ReWa Water Treatment Plant: this facility contains chemicals used for waste water treatment as well as has large silos of treated waste water which has the potential for submersion or engulfment hazards.

IPS packaging: this is a large custom shipping and packaging facility which contains large amounts of packaging materials i.e. cardboard and plastics. This facility is also in close proximity of residential homes. This facility would also need an aerial apparatus.

- -Lanexx: this is a large warehouse containing large amounts of merchandise to be shipped many petroleum based.
- -Anderson Hardwoods: this is a large manufacturing facility of hardwood flooring products. This facility also is a warehouse for large quantities of hardwood flooring. This facility would be in need of an aerial apparatus.
- -Quellen Manor Nursing Home: contains large quantities of elderly residence many of which are physically disabled. There are also small condominium suits that are in close proximity to this facility.
- -Fountain Inn Nursing Home: contains large quantities of elderly residence many of which are physically disabled.
- -Two (2) Mental Health Facilities: both facilities contain residence that are both physically and mentally handicapped.
- -Two (2) Industrial Parks: these industrial parks contain over 30 facilities that range in size and height. Many contain varieties of petroleum based materials used both in the manufacturing or shipping of materials.
