having the following metes and bounds, to-wit:

Beginning on a stone, Flora Nelson Templeton corner, running thence N. 94 W.
6.34 to a stone; thence S. 16 E. 78 links to a stone 3x; thence S. 67 E. 6.15 to a
stone; thence N. 4 E. 2.70 to the beginning corner. Bounded by lands of Flora Nelson
Templeton, Craig Street, lands formerly belonging to the J. H. Nelson Estate, now owned
by J. L. Gray, who being the same lot of land conveyed to Roxie Nelson Taylor by deed
