W. page 171, the Land to be conveyed contains Two hundred and thirty acres, and begins as follows, (viz) beginning at a Water oak on the bank of said river & runs on the original line S. 63 W. 56.00 to a stake 3x0.00. thence still on the original line N. 20 W. 39.00 over Pats branch to a stake 3x0.00 originally the line between Harry & Walker, thence down the meanders of said branch to the mouth of it, thence down said River to the beginning Water oak, which includes the land to be conveyed, together with all and singular the rights, members, Hereditaments and appurtenances, to the said premises belonging or in any wise incident, or appertaining To Have and to Hold all and singular the premises before mentioned, unto the said Abraham Smith, his Heirs and assigns forever. and I do hereby bind myself my Heirs, Executors and Administrators, to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said premises unto the said, Abraham Smith, his Heirs, and assigns against myself, my Heirs and against every other person whomsoever lawfully claiming or to claim the same in any part thereof.
