612 Charter
The State of South Carolina

Office of the Secretary of State,
Whereas M. J. Pope and G. L. Blackwell of Charlotte N.C. and A. P. Driscoll of Columbia S.C. did on the Seventeenth day of May 1899 file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration, signed by themselves setting forth:
First: The names and residences of the said petitioners to be as above given.
Second: The name of the proposed corporation to be that of The Peoples Bank of Greenville Association. The purpose of the said corporation to be to issue...

S.C. The general purpose of the corporation and the nature of business it proposes to do, will be to issue to any and all persons that may be deemed fit certificate of membership, who shall pay to the association from 5c to 50c per week, which will entitle the holder provided the dues are paid, to receive from the association sick dues, etc. the amount of \$1.25 to \$10, per week; and a death rate of \$20. to \$125. The said Association to have all the rights and powers usually enjoyed by a mutual and fraternal organization.

Third: That there will be no capital stock. And whereas, on the seventeenth day of May 1899, the said above named petitioners were commissioned by me a Board of Corporators. And whereas, the said Board of Corporators, on the twenty second day of May 1899, did file with the Secretary of State their return in writing over their signatures, certifying among other things, that pursuant to published notice as required in the Commission of the said Corporators the books of subscription to the capital stock of the aforesaid company were duly opened, that thereupon exceeding fifty per centum of the capital stock was subscribed by bona fide stockholders; that thereupon a meeting of the stockholders was called, and the aforesaid company duly organized by the election of a Board of Directors and other necessary officers.

That furthermore they have complied with all the requirements of an Act of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina entitled an Act to provide for the formation of certain corporations and to define the Powers thereof, approved the Ninth day of March A.D. 1896, and all acts amendatory thereto.

Now Therefore I M. R. Cooper, Secretary of State, by virtue of the authority in me vested by the aforesaid Act and acts amendatory thereof do hereby certify that the said company has been fully organized according to the laws of South Carolina under the name and for the purpose as stated in the
