 An Act

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To give certain property to Sarah Pennington and James D. Wilson, heirs of A. Barton Pennington, late of Greenville County, recently died, intestate, leaving certain property, real and personal, but nothing at law; and whereas, his natural mother Sarah Pennington and his residuary natural sister James D. Wilson, resided with him during his lifetime or his mother and sister, and were dependent upon him in great part if not altogether for support, and whereas, the said Sarah Pennington and James D. Wilson would be left without adequate support, if they had to renounce said property; Therefore, Section I. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That the State of South Carolina hereby renounce and release all her right, title, interest and estate, whatsoever the same may be of, in and to any and all property, real and personal, which the said A. Barton Pennington may have owned at the time of his death, unto the said Sarah Pennington and James D. Wilson, and their heirs, and assigns forever; Provided, that the said Sarah Pennington and James D. Wilson shall within ninety days from and after the approval of this Act pay into the Treasury of the State the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, and either the Treasurer's receipt therefor, or the entry thereof on the Treasury Books, shall be sufficient evidence of the right, title, interest and estate of the said Sarah Pennington and James D. Wilson, and to the said property.

Section 2. That all Acts, and parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act, be and the same are hereby repealed.
