WHEREAS, Jas. L. Orr, G.A. Norwood, W.H. Updegraff, J.H. Morgan, A.G. Miller, Frank Hammond, J.D. Woodruff, and P.P. Verner, all of Greenville, S.C., did on the 26th day of May, 1902, file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration, signed by themselves, setting forth the name and place of business of the proposed corporation to be that of Woodside Cotton Mills.

FIRST: The name of the proposed corporation to be as above given.
