to a stone $3 x$ in the road; thence with said line to a sourwood $3 x$; thence with the Rachael Lindsey line to a stone $3 x$; thence with said line to the "Wheeler Hickory" $3 x$; thence to a white oak, $3 x$ (Hulda Lindsey corner); thence with the branch to an ash $3 x$; thence with a line of the William Howard tract to a stone 3 x ; thence to a chestnut 3 x ; thence with the dividing line to the beginning chestnut; this being the other half of the eighty (80) acre tract above described as having been conveyed by James Gosnell to Calvin Howard on Jan. 10, 1880, and by said Calvin Howard to Decatur Howard and William Howard on Feb. 6, 1888; the said William Howard having released to the said Decatur Howard his undivided one-half interest in the last mentioned forty (40) acre tract, by deed of Feb. 2, 1899, recorded June 15, 190.4, in Deed Book L L L at page 709; and the said Decatur Howard having conveyed said tract to J. C. Prewette, by deed Jan. 2, 1904, recorded June 15, 1904, in Deed Book L L L at page 696, and the said J. C. Prewette having conveyed the said tract to me, the said R. E. Johnston, by deed April 4, 1904, recorded June 15, 1904, in Deed Book L I L at page 695.
27. Also those two tracts on Gap Creek of North Saluda River, containing respectively, 77 acres and 68 acres and having the following metes and and bounds, respectively, according to two plats thereof prepared by Will D. Neves, Surveyor, bearing date April 22, 1904, and herewith delivered, to-wit:

First, that tract beginning on a white oak 3 x on (down) on Gap Creek at the top of the shoals, and running thence N .10 E .3 .00 to a poplar $3 \times \mathrm{m}$ m on Portman Howard's corner; thence along the line of Portman Howard land N. 20 E. 35 chains to a hickory $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{x}$ o m (gone) on the corner of the Portman Howard land; thence N. 78 E. 21.50 chains to a stone $3 \times \mathrm{m}$ on or near a ledge of large rocks; thence S . 37 E . along the line of the land of the Harris Pittman land 17.00 chains to a chestnut $3 \times \mathrm{mm}$ (down); thence S .48 E . along the line of the land of the Timothy Pitman land, 6.00 chains to a maple station on Gap Creek, near the "Winds;" thence down said Gap Creek following the meanders thereof to the beginning corner, containing 77 acres, more or less; this tract lying wholly on the west side of Gap Creek; and being the same conveyed unto me, the said R. Also, those two tracts adjoining each other in Saluda Township on two small branches of Gap Creek of North Saluda River, containing the aggregate, 58 acres, more or less, and being the same lands conveyed to me, the said R. E. Johnston, by Green Hunt, by deed Feb. 24, 1904, recorded in Greenville County, April 11, 1904, in Deed Book L L. L. at page 556; said two tracts being separately described as follows, to-wit:
"First, that tract containing 25 acres, more or less, adjoining lands of J. P. Charles, (formerly belonging to Needful Green) S. Jackson Dickey (formerly belonging to Luther Brown) Noah Pruitt, and the 33 acres next hereinafter described; this being the land conveyed to said Green Hunt by George Murray, by deed April 7, 1890, recorded in Greenville County, South Carolina, Jan. 14, 1891, in Deed Book XX at page 392, by deed Dec. 11, 1876, recorded Greenville County, South Carolina, Jan. 12, 1877, in Deed Book HH at page 620, and conveyed to said Elisha Pruitt by Davis W. H. Fuller); thence N. 13 W. 22.50 chains passing a Spanish oak, and crossing a branch and running to a stake in the State road; thence running with said State road northwestwardly 19.23 chains to the beginning corner; this being the same tract of land conveyed to the said Green Hunt by Davis W.
