WHEREAS, Marion Brawley, David Kohn and A. H. Hammond all of Greenville, S. C.

did on the sixth day of March, 1911 file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration, signed by themselves, setting forth:

First: The names and residences of the said petitioners to be as above given.

Second: The name of the proposed corporation be that of OSCEOLA COMMISSION COMPANY.

Third: The principal place of business of the corporation will be near Greenville, S. C.

Fourth: The general purpose of the corporation, and the nature of business it proposes to do is that of buying and selling cotton goods, and other textile fabrics, and of all articles and by-products manufactured, produced or used by cotton factories, and to manufacture and finish textile products and articles which are used in the manufacture of textile products. Among the powers desired are the following: the right to acquire and transfer both real and personal property, including stocks of other corporations; to borrow money, make notes, bonds or other evidences of debt, and to do all other things and acts which a corporation is authorized to do by the Statutes and Laws of this State.
