

BEGINNING on a chestnut tree and running thence to John Plumley's line; thence nearly south to a hickory; thence nearly west to a poplar; thence to a sourwood, the dividing line between lands of William Howard and Decatur Howard; thence to a rock in the road; thence to the wagon road; thence with said road to the beginning corner.

(42) That tract in Glassy Mountain Township, on the head waters of South Pacolet River, containing 50 acres, more or less, and described as follows:

BEGINNING on the "Old Wheelers hickory" 3xom (now down), and running thence nearly east to a walnut 3x; thence 4-3/4 ". 20.00 chains to a chestnut 3xom (down); thence nearly west with the line of the Wm. and Decatur Howard land to a stone 3x; thence nearly southeast to the beginning corner.

(43) That tract of land conveyed to R. E. Johnston by C. A. Gosnell by Deed dated July 18, 1905, recorded in Deed Volume 000, at page 366, R.M.C. Office, Greenville County, S.C., containing 36 acres, more or less.

(44) All that certain piece, parcel or tract of land situate, lying and being in the County of Greenville, State of South Carolina, in Saluda River Township, on Brady's Branch of North Saluda River, containing 161 acres, more or less, having the following metes and bounds according to a plat of Will D. Neves, bearing date July 17, 1905, to-wit:

BEGINNING at a maple 3xom on Brady Branch, and running thence due west (crossing Fuller Mountain Road) 39.00 chains along line of J. E. Johnston to a stone 3xom; thence S. 5 1/2 W. along line of J.W. Hightower land 26.50 chains to a hickory 3xom; thence S. 87 E. 31.50 chains to a hickory 3xom; thence S. 88 E. (crossing Fuller Mountain Road) 34 chains to a small hickory 3xom; thence N. 6 1/2 along line of James Gosnell land 15.60 chains to a poplar 3xom on Brady Branch; thence up the said branch, following the meanders thereof, about 26.50 chains to the beginning corner.

(45) That tract of land in Glassy Mountain Township, containing 186 acres, more or less, lying on the top of Hogback Mountain, known as the Ramsey Butler tract and being more fully described as follows:

BEGINNING at a forked chestnut and running thence S. 55 E. 24.00 chains to a hickory; thence S. 15 W. 18.00 chains to a hickory; thence S. 15 W. 18 chains to a hickory; thence S. 60 W. 20.00 chains to a red oak; thence S. 24 W. 3.50 chains to a hickory; thence S. 58 E. 4.00 chains to a red oak; thence N. 70 E. 20.00 chains to a Spanish oak; thence due east 16 chains to a red oak; thence N. 79 E. 20.00 to a Spanish oak; thence N. 40 E. 7.00 chains to a pine; thence N. 9 E. 23.00 chains to a Spanish oak; thence N. 56 W. 3.50 chains to a pine; thence S. 77 W. 9.00 chains to a Spanish oak; thence N. 75 W. 5.00 chains to a hickory; thence N. 62 W. 14.00 chains to a forked chestnut at the beginning corner.
