AFFIDAVIT

COUNTY OF GREENVILLE

PERSONALLY appeared before me Charles W. Spence, an attorney of the Greenville Bar, who after being duly sworn deposes and says:

That the deponent examined the title of John Robinson known as a portion of lot no. 3 on plat of Central Realty Corporation, plat book K at page 143 and found an absence of records in the Greenville County Court House pertaining to the below mentioned persons and their heirs, brothers and sisters, and that pursuant thereto the deponent did prepare an affidavit for the signature of Sloan D. and Lillie Sammons Southern but that Sloan D. and Lillie Sammons Southern refused to sign the same, not due to lack of truthness or veracity, but due to lack of understanding of the purpose of said affidavit.

The affidavit is as follows:

Personally appeared before me Sloan D. Southern and Lillie Sammons Southern, who are man and wife. These deponents depose under oath and say that Sloan D. Southern, Luther Southern and Emmer Southern Bridwell were brothers and sisters and were the children of Eva Southern and W. P. Souther;

That W. P. Southern is now dead, but that on 17 May, 1917, at the time he conveyed lot 1 unto his daughter Emmer Southern Bridwell, he was the sole owner of the property and that Sloan and Luther Southern were merely his sons who signed the deed with him. That W.P.Southern's wife, Eva, is now long dead, and did not remarry;

That Emmer Southern, daughter of W.P. and Eva Southern, married one W.B. Bridwell, and has two children of her body, to-wit: Gordon Bridwell and Raymond Bridwell; that Emmer Southern is not now living and that W.B. Bridwell has now remarried;

That these deponents depose and say that they knew Emmer Southern Bridwell and know of this own knowledge that she had no other heirs or distributees other than her husband, W.B. Bridwell and her two sons, Gordon and Raymond Bridwell.

That your deponent did, in the presence of a witness, proceed to the home of Sloan and Lillie Southern on the 11th day of April, 1958 and did read each and every sentence therein unto Sloan D. Southern and he acknowledged the truthness of the same and that he acknowledged the affidavit to be true and correct as to his heirs, brothers and sisters, nephews and nieces and his mother and father but that he yet refused to sign the same, under the impression that in some manner he was being trapped or fooled or that someone would take undue advantage of him.

That your deponent is fully satisfied with the truth and veracity of the above affidavit which he was requested to sign and did receive an affirmative answer in each instance when questioned about the above affidavit and whether or not the same were true, such as, was W.P. Southern your father and is he now dead, etc. and in each instance Sloan D. Southern answered affirmatively thereby verifying the statements contained in said affidavit.
