To have and to hold the said tract of one hundred acres of land more or less with every the premises and appurtenances thereunto belonging unto the said Thomas Samford his heirs Executors, Administrators and assigns from the day next before the day of the date of these presents for and during the term and full end of one whole year from thence next ensuing and fully to be completed and ended yielding and paying therefore unto the said Michael Purkle the rent of one peck of corn on the last day of the said term if the same shall be lawfully demanded, to the intent and purpose that by virtue of these presents and by force of the Statute for transferring of uses into possession he the said Thomas Samford may be in actual possession of all and singular the premises above mentioned with every the appurtenances thereunto belonging and thereby be the better enabled to have take and receive the reversion and Inheritance thereof which is intended to be to him and his heirs granted and released by the said Michael Purkle by another Indenture intended to be made and dated the day next after the day of the date hereof. This Indenture made this twenty fourth day of April in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred and Eighty Nine, and in thirteenth year of the Independence of the United States of America between Michael Purkle of Greenville County and State of South Carolina planter of the one part and Thomas Samford of the County and State aforesaid planter of the other part. Whereas in and by a certain grant bearing date the third day of April one thousand seven hundred and Eighty Six and in the year tenth year of the Independence of the United States of America from and under the hand and Seal of his Excellency William Moultrie Esquire Governor and commander in chief in and over the said State, and the great seal of the said State for that purpose appointed did give and grant unto Michael Purkle a plantation or tract of two hundred acres of land situate lying and being in the district of ninety six above the antient boundary line on both sides of Reddy River bounding on all sides on vacant land when surveyed and both such form and marks as appears by a plat thereof to the said grant annexed as in and by the said plat and grant duly recorded in the Secretarys office of the said State in Book I. I. I. page 382 reference thereunto being had may more fully appear Now this Indenture Witnesseth that the said Michael Purkle for and in consideration of the sum of thirty pounds Sterling to him in hand well and truly paid by the said Thomas Samford before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, He the said Michael Purkle hath bargained, sold, remised, conveyed, and confirmed, and by these presents do grant bargain, sell, alien, remise, convey and confirm unto the said Thomas Samford in his actual possession now being by virtue of a bargain and sale to him thereof made for one whole year and by force of the Statute for transferring of uses into possession and to his heirs and assigns forever one hundred acres of land more or less being part of the above mentioned tract of two hundred acres, laid out unto the said Thomas Samford as follows beginning on a Hickory tree which stands in the line of the above mentioned tract of two hundred acres on the bank of the said Reddy River, from thence running S W 50° on the said line to the corner on a red oak, from thence running N W 40° to the corner on a black Jack, from thence running N E 50° to Hugh Roark's line, from thence running on the said Hugh Roark's line to the said River, from thence bounding on the said River down to the beginning including one hundred acres of land more or less, Together with all and singular the Houses outhouses, Edifices, building
