

Thomas & Robert Maxwell as Judges of the Court where the Letters of Administration were Granted have thought proper in Order to save expence to the Estate & Creditors thereof upon the said Appsons giving them sufficient Indemnification to Order a Sale of the said Negroes to satisfy first the debts the said Samuel Earle may have against the Estate the balance of the Amt. of sales to be applied to the discharge of the said Appsons demands — The Condition therefore of the aforesaid Obligation is such that if the before mentioned Mr. Appson, Henry Mathem Wood or Mr. Wood their heirs Executors Administrators or assigns and every of them do & shall from time to time & at all times hereafter warrant & defend the Title of the said Negroes to the purchasers and the Increase of the Families from all lawful claims that may be set up to them & do also further Indemnify the said Judges against any damage that may accrue for such their Order of Sale & do further provided it may be hereafter necessary support according to Law the Justice of the demands he has produced against the said Estate then this Obligation to be void, or else to remain in full force

The following Release Together with the Lease thereunto belonging from James King to Henry Paris being proven before John Blasingame Esq. by the oath of David McKinzie was presented and Recorded this 27th day of April 1795  
South Carolina. This Indenture made the eighteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety five and in the nineteenth year of the Independance of the united states of North America between James King of Laurens County in the state aforesaid planter & Margret King his wife of the one part & Henry Paris of Greenville County in the state of South Carolina aforesaid planter of the other part Witnesseth that the said James King and Margret King his wife in consideration of four shillings & no more in hand paid by the said Henry Paris have granted bargained & sold & by these presents do grant bargain & sell unto the said Henry Paris his heirs Exors. Admors. & assigns all that piece or tract of land containing by Estimation two hundred acres lying and being in Greenville County aforesaid on branches of a Creek a branch of Saluda River bounding when
