Pinson and I do hereby bind myself my heirs Executors and administrators to warrant and for ever defend all and singular the said premises unto the trustees aforesaid during the life of my daughter Sarah M. Pinson and after her death to her children or the survivors of them Share and Share a like & to their heirs or assigns forever against my self & my heirs & against all others.

 62. to a stake on the road North East 9 chains to a small Walnut
 thence N. 24. E. 13. chains to a post oak thence North 8. E. 45. chains 50
 links to a red oak thence N. 82. W. 6. 25. to a chestnut thence N. 61. W. 67.
 chains 75 links to hickory thence S. 80. W. 5. chains 25 links to a poplar
 thence S. 55. E. 5. chains to a black oak thence S. 79. W. 2. chains 84 links
 to a chestnut thence South 30. W. 26. chains 50 links to a stake thence
 N. 0. 1. chains to a post oak thence South 26. W. 19. chains 50 links
