 of two hundred and twenty five Dollars to me in hand well and
 truly paid to be made the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge all
 to that tract or parcel of land containing one hundred and four acres
 the same more or less, situate in Greenville and State aforesaid on the
 with side of Conocee River, beginning in a post oak S^o 68 E 39.70
 dead Oak 3x S^o 20 W 49 Pine & over to the River, thence up the meander
 of the river to a cross fence formerly Barny's line, thence with a straight line
 near the fence to the beginning. Together with all and singular the
 rights members, buildiments and appurtenances thereto appertaining
 unto the said premises or in anywise incident unto the said Austin
 Taylor his heirs and assigns for ever and I do hereby bind myself
 take my Executors and Administrators, and my heirs to warrant & defend
 them all and singular said premises before mentioned unto the said
 Austin Taylor his heirs and assigns against my heirs and
 assigns my Executors Administrators and any other person or persons
 lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof In witness whereof I have set my
 hand and seal this the 17 January in the year our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight one
