District aforesaid for and in consideration of the sum of Fifty Dollars to me in Hand paid by William Bates of the State and District aforesaid, have bargained, sold, granted and released, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, and release a tract or parcel of land, containing fifty acres more or less situate on the waters of Enoree River in the State and district aforesaid, beginning on a Black Gum on William Bates' line; thence on said line running nearly S. E. to a chestnut, thence to a Pine, thence to a Red Oak, thence to a Post oak, thence to a red oak, thence to a Pine corner on James B. Johnson's line thence on said Johnson's line to a Spanish oak corner, thence running on James Johnson's line to red oak, thence to a Hickory, thence to a small creek on branch of Enoree River, thence up the meanders of said branch to the mouth of first branch, thence up the meanders of said branch to a Post oak, thence to Hickory, thence to a white oak, thence up the meanders of the stream branch running from Wm. Bates' Pinel place to the beginning. Together with all and singular the rights, members, appendages and appurtenances thereto belonging or in any wise incident or appertaining to have and to hold all and singular the
