Whereas certain unpleasant family dissensions have
arisen and continue to exist between James McCullough
of the late of Indian and Sam McCullough

and his wife Jane Martin both now of the District and state of South Carolina as the
same all the said parties have established a prospect of their difficulties being settled upon such terms as would con-
fine them to continue to live harmoniously in the relation of man and wife and believing
it to be that the peace and happiness of each party to be promoted by an entire separation
from the other and by living separate and apart from each other New Haven all men by
present that this article of agreement made and entered into by the said James McCullough
of the one part and Robert Peden as Trustee for the said Sam McCullough and
Jane McCullough of the other witness the said James McCullough and the
said Jane his wife have agreed contract stipulated and covenanted and by these presents
do agree to contract stipulate and covenant to live separate and apart from each other from this
date as long as they may live and the said James McCullough on his part covenants
to agree with the said Robert Peden Trustee as regards with the consent of the said James
McCullough to release and forever extinguish all the right title and interest of what nature
soever he may have or may hereafter have in or to the
lands or property Society and services of the said wife Jane for and during her life And
that the said James McCullough hereby agrees and obligates himself that he may
not bequeath or administer any part of the sum of One Thousand dollars to me in
any part by the said Robert Peden the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged to convey
to him the following property to wit On whose full name Agnes Belton
being five and Thirtieth year of age On the first of May next each one Horse and one
Carriage & all the household and kitchen furniture that the said Jane had and
brought into the possession of the said James McCullough on the return among with
to the said Robert Peden in trust now being for the exclusive use benefit and
service of the said Jane who is to have use and enjoy the same property separate and
apart during her life and the same to dispose of as she may think proper free from
all hindrance from or by the said husband as far as fully to all intents and purposes as
she has never intermarried with said James McCullough

And the said Jane by herself and by Robert Peden the Trustee covenants
with us with the said James McCullough to relinquish to him all the right claim and title
she now has or may hereafter have to any of his property now deserved or hereafter acquired
to him and to all his protection maintenance and support for the future as fully as if
the said James and Jane had never intermarried with each other

For the full and faithful performance of the foregoing acts of separation and settle-
ment each party binds that is the said James McCullough un binding of the one party and the said
Jane McCullough and Robert Peden of the other bind themselves their heirs Executors admiri-
tators and assigns mutually the one party to the other in the sum of One Thousand dollars
to be removed from that party who shall fail to execute the foregoing stipulations of the other party
