

An Agreement.  
State of South Carolina

Whereas Abraham Green, late of the County and State aforesaid departed this life on or about June the 11th 1874, leaving as his heirs at law and distributees his widow Jane E Green, and his four children B A Green J E Green, A A Green and Jessie A Green, all of whom, that is to say, all of the children were at that time under the age of twenty one years, and all of whom are now over the age of twenty one years; And whereas the said Abraham Green left his last will and testament in which he indicated his intention to be that each child should have their share of his said estate upon their attaining the age of twenty one years but that no title should vest in them until they arrived at the age of twenty five years, and that under said will the widow and mother of the above named children qualified as Executrix of said will.

And whereas the said Abraham Green left a considerable estate but the terms and language of the said will were of such a nature that it cannot be followed in the division or distribution of said estate among the heirs aforesaid.

And whereas the said estate was by mutual consent of all the parties hereto, which said consent is hereby ratified and affirmed, appraised by three disinterested men, and the value of all the property by them fixed and that on the 11 day of January 1888 the sum of Three thousand nine hundred (\$3923.70) and twenty three &  $\frac{7}{10}$  / 100 was set apart as one fifth of the said estate and delivered to B A Green, and that on the said date he was then more than twenty one years old, and that on the 21st day of December 1889 the sum of four thousand two hundred and forty &  $\frac{9}{10}$  / 100 (\$4240.90) Dollars was set apart to Thad E Green, he having arrived at the age of twenty one years, that sum being the one fourth of the estate after the part to B A Green had been delivered, which said sum to T E Green was so adjudged by disinterested appraisers and delivered to him, and on the fourth day of April 1893 by appraisers the sum of four thousand four hundred and
