WHEREAS, J. T. Aiken and A. T. Aiken, both of Greenville S.C., and A. S. Farmer, of Anderson, S.C.

did on the 18th day of January, 1926, file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration signed by themselves, setting forth:

FIRST: That their names and residences are as above given.

SECOND: That the name of the proposed Corporation is Piedmont Paint Manufacturing Company.

THIRD: That the principal place of business is Greenville, S.C.

FOURTH: That the general nature of the business which it is proposed to do is to make, manufacture, deal in, purchase, sell, or otherwise acquire or dispose of paints, varnishes, lacquers, and allied materials and other real and personal property of every kind and description whatsoever.

FIFTH: That the amount of the capital stock is Fifty thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, payable as and when called for by the Board of Directors.

SIXTH: That the number of shares into which the capital stock is divided is Three hundred (300) of the par value of One hundred (\$100.00) dollars each.

SEVENTH: That, after due notice, a meeting of the subscribers was held on the 9th day of January, 1926, at which a majority of all stock in value being present in person or by proxy, the following were elected directors:

J. T. Aiken, A. T. Aiken and A. S. Farmer

EIGHT: That subsequently there was elected as President J. T. Aiken, as Vice-President, A. S. Farmer; as Secretary, A. T. Aiken; as Treasurer, J. T. Aiken.

NINTH: That all requirements of Chapter XLVII, Article I, of the Civil Code of South Carolina, 1922, and all amendments thereto, have been duly and fully complied with, 50 per cent. of the aggregate amount of the capital stock having been subscribed by bona fide subscribers, 20 per cent. of the capital stock subscribed having been paid to the Treasurer, and three days' public notice of the intention to file this Declaration with the Secretary of State having been given in Greenville Daily News, a newspaper published in the County of Greenville.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, H. P. Blackwell, Secretary of State, by virtue of the authority in me vested by the aforesaid Code and Acts amendatory thereto, do hereby certify that the said Company has been fully organized according to the laws of South Carolina, under the name and for the purposes indicated in their written declaration, and that they are fully authorized to commence business under their charter; and I do hereby direct that a copy of this certificate be filed and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds Conveyance or Clerk of Court in each county where such Corporation shall have a business office.

WHEREAS, Shepard Saltzman, E. W. Rainey and G. W. Coffield, all of Greenville, S.C.,

did on the 19th day of January, 1926, file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration signed by themselves, setting forth:

FIRST: That their names and residences are as above given.

SECOND: That the name of the proposed Corporation is Piedmont Shirt Company.

THIRD: That the principal place of business is Greenville, S.C.
