in the State aforesaid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, sold and released, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and release, unto the said J. Robt. Martin

all that piece, parcel or lot of land in Greenville Township, Greenville County, State of South Carolina, consisting of 20 acres more or less and being the lands conveyed to Sarah A. Bull by R. A. Means, April 10th, 1882 and recorded in R. M. C. Office, Greenville County the 13th day of May 1882, Vol. N.N., Page 64 and having the following boundaries and descriptions:

Beginning in the middle of Saluda River near the mouth of the Spring Branch and Birch tree; thence N. E. 200 ft. to the intersecting cross line; thence S. E. to the center of a abandoned railroad; thence S. along the center of a abandoned railroad to the center of Saluda River, (Formally railroad bridge across Saluda River); thence up the middle of Saluda River to the beginning corner bounded by lands now owned by J. Robt. Martin, Owens and the Saluda River.
