the health, happiness, mental, physical, and nervous condition of each of the parties hereto and their unborn child, that they should separate and continue to live separate and apart from each other; and

WHEREAS, The parties hereto desire to make and enter into this written deed, contract, and agreement of separation to the end that all matters affecting the parties hereto with respect to the individual and property rights as one against the other, and all other questions affecting the mutual interest of the parties hereto, may be adjusted, agreed upon, and determined.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE PREMISES AND

In consideration of the mutual promises and agreements of the
parties hereto, as hereinafter contained, and in consideration of
the sum of One (\$1.00) Dollar paid to each of the parties hereto by
the remaining party hereto, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto and, especially the said William Marvin
Elmore, being fully advised of all rights, claims, and demands
which he may have against the said Dorothy N. Elmore, and after consulting with his attorneys, being convinced that it is to his interest
to finally settle all claims between him and the said Dorothy N.
Elmore concerning their marital rights and obligations do hereby
solemnly agree and bind themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns forever, to the following articles of agreement:

- 1. That the said Dorothy N. Elmore is to have complete custody and control of their unborn child, and the said Dorothy N. Elmore agrees to assume the support and maintenance of said unborn child at its birth and will make no claims or demands upon the said William Marvin Elmore for the support and maintenance of said unborn child after its birth.
- 2. That in consideration of the signing of this instrument, the said William Marvin Elmore is to pay to the said Dorothy N. Elmore the sum of Three Thousand ($\S 3,000.00$) Dollars in cash.
- 3. That the said William Marvin Elmore is to turn over and deliver in good condition their 1941 Pontiac Sedan to the said Dorothy N. Elmore, together with all registration and other papers pertaining thereto so as to give her good title to the same.
