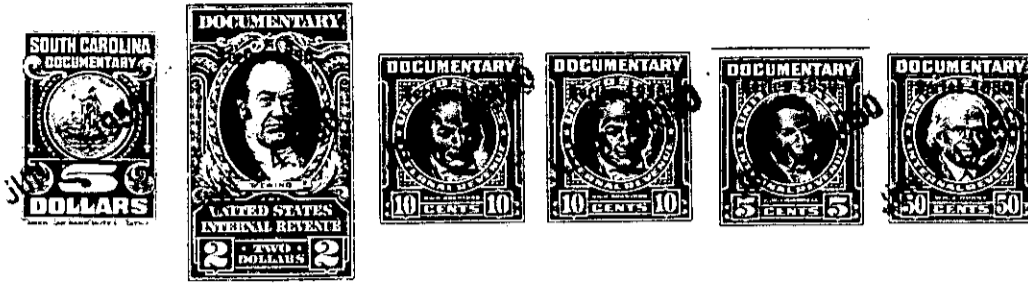

all that piece, parcel or lot of land in Oaklawn Township, Greenville

County, State of South Carolina, just off the Augusta Road and on the north side of the Pelzer-Old Hundred Road, and being part of the Vera R. Williamson home place. The lot herein conveyed is designated as lot No. 2 on a plat made by J. A. Pickens, Surveyor, on May 23, 1950, which shows the following courses and distances, to-wit:

BEGINNING at an iron pin on the north side of Pelzer-Old Hundred Road, joint corner of lot No. 3, and thence along north side of the road 84!10" to iron pin, joint corner of lot No. 1; thence along line of lot No. 1 N. 0-30 W. 235 feet 9 inches to iron pin; thence N. 84 E. 61 feet 9 inches to hickory tree; joint corner of lot No. 3; thence along line of lot No. 3 S. 4 E. 241 feet 6 inches to beginning corner. Bounded on the north by land of Vera R. Williamson, on the east by lot No. 3 being conveyed to J. Cecil Alverson, on the south by said road, and on the west by lot No. 1.
