NORTON, Widow, of Scotland County, North Carolina, and WILLIAM G. REYNOLDS of Pinellas County, Florida, in consideration of the sum of SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY AND NO/100 (\$750.00) DOLLARS to us in hand paid at and before the sealing of these presents by MARY S. GUESS, of Greenville County, South Carolina, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, sold and released, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and release unto the said Mary S. Guess, her heirs and assigns forever;

All of the northern two thirds (2/3) of Lots Nos. 344 and 365, Section F, of Springwood Cemetery, each lot having dimensions of seven feet four inches by eleven feet (7'4" X 11') as shown on map of said cemetery by Dalton and Neves, dated October 1, 1925; and being a portion of the same tract of land conveyed to W. A. Reynolds by the City Council of Greenville, South Carolina, by deed dated December 27, 1898, and recorded in Volume 6, Page 508, Greenville County Registry, to which said recorded deed reference is hereby made for a description of greater certainty.

W. A. Reynolds died intestate in 1937 and his sole surviving heirs at law were Iola Reynolds Norton, Widow, and William G. Reynolds, whose wife is Lessie C. Reynolds, all of whom are parties to this deed.
