And whereas the said premises, with their appurtenances, since the seizure by me made, by virtue of the said order of Court before mentioned have been exposed to sale at publick Vendue, and purchased by Robert Alexander of the district of Greenville for the sum of four hundred dollars, that price or sum being the highest that was bidden therefor: Now know ye that I the said Thomas Payne Sheriff aforesaid by virtue of the said "order of Court" to me directed and delivered as aforesaid, and by virtue of the Statute in such case made and provided, and for and in consideration of the said sum of four hundred dollars to me intituled paid or secured to be paid by the said Robert Alexander, the receipt and payment whereof I do hereby acknowledge, I have granted bargained and sold and by these presents do grant bargain and sell unto the said Robert Alexander his heirs and assigns forever the said tract piece and parcel of land with its appurtenances, and all the estate right title interest which the said James Seaborn or his heirs of right had of in & to the same: To have & to hold the said piece parcel and tract of land with its appurtenances unto the said Robert Alexander his heirs and assigns forever as fully and absolutely as I the said Thomas Payne might conceive or ought to Grant, bargain and sell the same, by virtue of the Statute aforesaid, and the said "order of Court", or otherwise.
