To Their Honors the Circuit Judges of  
the said State  
The Humble petition of John  
Adams sheweth unto your Honors that he is an alien  
that he was born in North Britton in the Kingdom of Great Britton, that he sailed  
from the port of Greenock in Scotland on the 17<sup>th</sup> October 1834 for the United States  
with the intention of there residing, that he landed at Charleston South Carolina on  
the 27<sup>th</sup> day of November 1834 and went immediately to North Carolina and there  
resided until the 20<sup>th</sup> September 1838, when he returned to South Carolina where he  
has ever since resided, and that he is now Thirty Eight years of age

My own petitioner is desirous of becoming a citizen of the United  
States, and on the 16<sup>th</sup> of April 1846 he filed in the Court of Common Pleas  
for said District the oaths of intention, required by the Acts of Congress in relation  
to the naturalization of foreigners

My own petitioner therefore prays that your Honors will cause  
to be administered to him the oath required by the Act of Congress for the naturalization  
of foreigners, and that you order the clerk of the Court Common Pleas for  
said District to issue to him a certificate of his naturalization And your petitioner  
with ever prayer He " 12<sup>th</sup> April 1848
