

The State of South Carolina,
By the Secretary of State.

Whereas, Charles E. Hicks, T. A. Monroe, Jr., and J. C. Fitzgerald did, on the tenth day of July, 1894, file with the Secretary of State a written declaration, signed by themselves, setting forth:

First: The names and residences of the said petitioners to be Charles E. Hicks, T. A. Monroe, Jr., and J. C. Fitzgerald, all of the City of Greenville, South Carolina. Second: The name of the proposed corporation to be that of "Cherokee Medicine Company" with its principal place of business in the City of Greenville, S. C.; the general purpose of the corporation and the nature of the business which it purposes to do is to manufacture and sell medicine of various kinds throughout the County of Greenville and State of South Carolina. Third: The amount of Capital Stock to be Nine thousand Dollars, and the number of Shares into which the same is to be divided to be fifty of the par value of one hundred Dollars each, with the privilege of increasing the Capital Stock to twenty-five thousand Dollars. And whereas, on the tenth day of July, 1894, the said Charles E. Hicks, T. A. Monroe, Jr., and J. C. Fitzgerald were commissioned by me a Board of Corporators, authorizing and empowering them to open books of subscription to the Capital Stock of said proposed Corporation, giving not less than one day's previous notice, by advertisement, in the _____, a newspaper published in the County of Greenville, giving notice of the time and place where said books of subscription would be opened: And whereas, the said Board of Corporators, on the twentieth day of July, A. D. 1894, did file with the Secretary of State their return in writing, over their signatures, certifying among other things; that fifty per cent of the Capital Stock has been subscribed; that a Board of Directors have been elected, to-wit: C. E. Watson, J. M. Lee, J. T. Coulton, A. D. Brown, T. A. Monroe, Jr., W. J. Graham, L. C. Richey, J. C. Fitzgerald and Chas. E. Hicks; that said Board of Directors elected a President, from its own number; that twenty per cent of the amount subscribed has been paid and the remainder secured to be paid.

Now, therefore, I, J. E. Findal, Secretary of State, by virtue of the authority in me vested by an Act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Formation of Certain Corporations under Special Laws," approved the twenty-third day of December, 1896, and all Acts amendatory thereto, do hereby certify that said Company has been fully organized, according to the Laws of South Carolina, under the name and for the purpose indicated in the within declaration, and that they are fully authorized to commence business under their Charter; and that a copy of this certificate be filed and recorded in the _____
