Item (5) <u>Proclamations and Special Recognition</u>

a. Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month

Chairwoman Seman presented a proclamation recognizing and commemorating March 2023 as "Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month." Ms. Seman stated bleeding disorders were characterized by the inability to form a proper blood clot and could lead to significant morbidity; bleeding disorders could be fatal if not treated effectively.

Ms. Seman stated increased knowledge of bleeding disorders would generate greater awareness and understanding of not only hemophilia but all inheritable bleeding disorders; a greater sense of community and shared purpose among individuals with inheritable bleeding disorders would be fostered by increased education.

Greenville County Council proclaimed March 2023 as "Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month."

b. Adoption of the Administrative Portions of the Collective Building Codes; Associated Appendix; Property Maintenance and Swimming Pool Codes

Vice-Chairwoman Seman presented for first reading an ordinance to comply with the regulations promulgated by the South Carolina Building Codes Council by repealing Ordinance Number 5147 and adopting the Administrative Provisions (Chapter 1) of the various codes relating to design review and inspection activities of the County of Greenville and enforcement of building provisions as provided in said codes; and an ordinance to adopt the International Property Maintenance Code, the International Swimming Pool and Spa Code and International Existing Building Code in Greenville County as authorized by the South Carolina Building Codes Council; and to adopt certain appendices of the adopted codes to recognize certain variations in the codes based on physical conditions found within Greenville County.

Chairman Tripp stated the item would remain on the floor.

Item (13) Administrator's Report

Mr. Kernell stated Greenville County's Animal Care Facility was experiencing an issue with a respiratory virus, similar to COVID, among its dog population. At the recommendation of a highly-skilled veterinarian, all dog-related activities were closed to the public for 14 days. Mr. Kernell stated the virus did not affect cats; therefore, all cat-related activities would continue by appointment.

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Item (14) Requests and Motions

a. Request Special Application Period for Planning Commission

 Councilor Harrison stated he recently attended the Greenville Chamber of Commerce's Annual Meeting. During that meeting, Chairwoman Liz Seman was presented with the 2022 ATHENA Leadership Award. Mr. Harrison stated Ms. Seman was also recently named as one of the Upstate's 2023 Women of Influence by GSA Business Report.

Mr. Harrison stated the Eastside YMCA would be expanding in the near future. He attended the groundbreaking ceremony held recently.

Councilor Harrison thanked Hesha Gamble and Tee Coker for all their hard work in regards to two projects located in his district. Both Ms. Gamble and Mr. Coker had visited the sites and reached out to the community a number of times.

Mr. Harrison stated legislation had been presented to the State House regarding the South Carolina Aeronautics Commission. The legislation would regulate development within a 3 mile radius of all airports. It would have major impacts on Greenville County as there were three airports (SCTAC, GSP and the Downtown Airport) located in the County. He was under the impression that May 10, 2023, was the deadline for amendments to the proposed. Mr. Harrison requested Council be prepared to consider the matter, if needed.

- Councilor Mitchell stated the Gordon Street Development, located in his district, was moving forward. It was his understanding that the proposed development was the first to use the new Greenville County Council Housing Policy. Cost of the project was approximately \$45 million and would use 60% AMI; a component for Safe Harbor was included in the plans. The developer planned to host a community meeting at Greater Mount Calvary Baptist Church on March 15, 2023, at 6 p.m.
- Chairwoman Seman congratulated the Furman Paladins for winning the Southern Conference Tournament the preceding evening.

Ms. Seman stated March was Women's History Month. She recognized the women who had served on Greenville County Council throughout the years; she was grateful for their service and the pathway they paved for her.

 Councilor Fant invited his colleagues to attend the Kingdom of Bahrain F-16 Block 70 Delivery Ceremony to be held at Lockheed Martin on Friday, March 10, 2023. A reception was planned for 10:00 a.m. followed by the ceremony at 11:30 a.m. The ceremony would commemorate the first F-16 to be produced at SCTAC. He reminded everyone that Greenville was now the global headquarters of the F-16. Councilor Russo stated he was very excited about the Communications and Governmental Affairs Committee. They met the previous week and he looked forward to what the committee would be able to accomplish.

Mr. Russo stated he attended a community meeting at River Falls the previous week. There was good discussion regarding the bond; things were moving in the right direction for a responsive and equipped fire department to meet the needs of the community.

- Councilor Shaw stated he was very excited about the Conestee Dam Project.
- Chairman Tripp stated the last three months had been exemplary; things had not been perfect but Council had managed to get a lot done in an expeditious manner. He thanked his colleagues for their hard work on the committee level and on the dais.
