is hereby acknowledged), have Granted, Bargained, Sold and Released, and by these presents do Grant, Bargain, Sell and Release, unto the said Mrs. Cannie H. Woodside, all of our share, right and interest in a certain lot of land located in State and County above mentioned and bounded by land of J. D. McRitchie, J. L. Spruce, W. H. Stewart and Mrs. F. R. Loden. The same land being the remaining portion of a tract originally containing 190 acres that was conveyed to J. M. Thackston by Miss D. H. Stenhouse by deed dated Aug. the 18th, 1890 and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds, Conveyance for Greenville County Vol. 70, page 572. The remaining lot that is herein conveyed being the same homestead on which J. M. Thackston resided at time of his death and has such shape and measured as will be seen on the plot of the original land as surveyed by J. H. Stewart in 1890 and subdivided on the same plat by the same surveyor in Aug. 1896. The lot of land herein described and conveyed is estimated to contain forty-four and $\frac{6}{100}$ acre, more or less.
