In the State aforesaid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, sold and released, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and quitclaim ~~to~~ C. T. Thomason, his heirs and assigns,

All my right, title and interest in and to all that lot of land situate in the State and County aforesaid in Fairview Township and on the branch waters of Reedy River and adjoining lands of W. J. Thomason, Archie Peden estate, and others and known as a portion of the Hewlett Sullivan land, and consisting of 18 acres more or less and having the following mates, bounds and courses:

Beginning at a stone on (C. T. Thomason) land, thence S.  $77\frac{1}{2}$  E. 22.16 to center of branch; thence down the branch 10.37 to stone, on the bank of branch, thence N.  $68\frac{1}{2}$  W. 25.20 to stone in center of road, thence N.  $15\frac{1}{2}$  E. to stone, thence N.  $36\frac{1}{2}$  W. 1.80 to stone, thence N.  $38\frac{1}{2}$  E. 2.68 to stone in beginning corner.
