Know a 11 men by these presents:

That I, Beulah Cox Stokes, widow of the late Dr. T. 3. Stokes, and daughter of the late Arris Cox, of the County of Greenville, in the State aforesaid, for and in consideration of Ten (310.00) Pollars and other good and valuable considerations, and veneration pro memory of James McDavid, a patrict and soldier of the American Revolution, have given, granted and conveyed, and by these presents do give, grant and convey to Albert C. (Bert) McDavid of San Antonio, Texas, second great grandson of the said James McDavid (see S.A.R. Volume No. 29,489), all of that certain tract, lot or parcel of land known as the "Lower" or Did AcDavid Family Cametery; "situated, laying and being in the Punklin Township in the extreme Southern portion of the County of Greenville, State of South Carolina, being further described as;

A plot of ground 52 feet squere, more or less, which is located about 24 miles South of Greenville, C. E. S. C., and about 1750 yards West of the present South Carolina State Highway (Old Greenville and Augusta Poad), now U. S. Highway No. 25; and on top of a hill about 250 yards East of the East Branch of Lountain Creek, and about 100 yards North of the "Old Dirt Road" which starts about 5 miles North of Laurens County Line and extends from the Ed. Knight Place on said Augusta Road to Oak Hill (sometimes called "Bethsada") Methodist Church.

For more detailed identification, below herein are given the names and dates on ten of the legible grave-stones of those at present interred in this family commutery, viz.

James boDavid, soldier of the American Revolution (ne February 10, 1766, mort June 5, 1853); and immediately to the North of his grave is that of his wife, Penelope Rogers AcDavid, (nee October 10, 1760, morte baron 9, 1852); and immediately to the North of her grave, Hiram beDavid, a son of James and Penelope beDavid, (ne July 7, 1799, mort January 7, 1641); and next North, another of their sons, Abner AcDavid (no January 3, 1707, mort Movember 22, 1935); thence about 15 feet East of James AcDavid's grave is that of John AcDavid (ne December 8, 1788, mort April 17, 1854) the eldest son of the above mentioned James and Penelope AcDavid; thence immediately South of John McDavid's grave is that of his wife, Susannah Davenport McDavid (nee October 19, 1795, morte November 6, 1861) sne, a daughter of William and Phoebe D avenport; and immediately East of the above mentioned grave of Abner AcDavid is that of Strother D. Shumate (ne January 20, 1781, mort December 3, 1834) he, being the husband of Anny AcDavid, the later (Anny) being the eldest daughter of James and Penelope AcDavid; thence immediately to the South and adjoining said Shumate's grave is that of Harriet Acker (no dates being shown on her grave marker). Thence immediately East of S. D. Shumate's grave is that of William Augustus &cDevid (ne barch 12, 1830, mort barch 23, 1834) he, being the eldest son of Allen and Theresa Acker McDavid; thence immediately East is that of Tandy W. AcDavid (ne September 7, 1831, mort June 11, 1835) he, being the twin of Ardy P. AcDavid and son of Allen McDavid;

The said James & CDavid, soldier, being a son of John Madison & David and __Allen & David. The said John & & CDavid in about 1730 emigrated from County Antrim, Ireland, to the Cub Run District of the S. W. portion of Virginia and later during the fall of A. D. 1705 emigrating to what is now the Northern edge of Laurens County, South Carolina. The said James & CDavid, soldier and patriot, whose grave is herein referred to, being a direct lineal descendant of "The MacDavid, Lord of Clanconow, Roscommon, Kileroan and Ballymoe (Celtic Peerage) of Calway and Mayo in the Province of Connaught, Ireland, who on their battle shield, bore the Norman Croise of their Godfrey (A. D. 1097) and blazon motto "In hoc signo vinces." In the later British Peerage, this same line being represented by the "Burke of Glinsk", who in A. D. 1638, as the Earl of St. Loans was granted an English Baronetcy during the reign of Carlos I, same being based on this original MacDavid Bourke, descendant of William de Burge or de Burgh (A. D. 1171, tem Henry II). Irish "Annals of the Four Masters" also "O'Hart's Irish Pedigrees", quod vide.

The said family cemetery tract being more particularly described and designated as follows, to-wit:

Situated on the within the 254 acres of land in the Dunklin Township of Greenville County, said surrounding 254 acres being bounded by lands previously owned by John W. McCulloch and J. Ed Knight, and to settle an estate sold at Master's Sale in the Greenville Court of Common Pleas on the 18th dayof August, A. D. 1899, as described in Judgment Roll, No. A-1618, now on file in the office of the Clerk of Court, Graenville, County, South Carolina together with all and singular the rights, members and appurtenances, to the said family cemetery tract in any manner belonging.
