AND I do hereby bind myself and my Heirs, Executors and Administrators to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said Premises unto the said Richard Furman Watson, Jr., Evelyn Peyton Watson, individually, and as Trustee for Richard F. Watson, III, and Bernard Peyton Watson, their heirs, successors and assigns, against myself and my heirs and against every person whomsoever lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof.
