All that parcel or tract of land in Oneal Township of Greenville County, South Carolina, located about three miles north of the City of Greer and on the southwest side of road which leads to the Chandler place from State Highway No. 101, being shown as Tract No. 12 on a plat of property made for the W.C. Chandler Estate by John A. Simmons, Surveyor, dated August 26, 1963, to be recorded, having the following courses and distances BEGINNING on a stone, old corner, on the southwest corner of the lot herein conveyed, and runs thence S. 86-10 E. 134.1 feet to old iron pin corner; thence N. 20-54 E. 147.2 feet to a stake on the center of sideroad (iron pin back on line at 15 feet); thence along and with the center of said road, N. 60-46 W. 200 feet; thence S. 3-00 W. 226.8 feet to the beginning.
