KNOW ALL MEN that I, MINNIE CALDWELL BROWN, of the County of Greenville, State of South Carolina, being of sound mind and fully understanding the intent of this document and all that it contains therein, do hereby constitute and appoint SARA ZELENE CALDWELL of the County of Greenville, State of South Carolina, my true and lawful attorney for me and in my name, place and stead, conferring upon her all of the usual powers granted an attorney in fact and specifically those hereinafter set forth. This Power of Attorney shall not be affected by physical disability or mental incompetency of the said principal, Minnie Caldwell Brown, which renders the principal incapable of managing her own estate showing the intent of the principal, Minnie Caldwell Brown, that the authority conferred shall be exercisable notwithstanding her physical disability or mental incompetency. The authority of the Power of Attorney in Pact is exercisable by her as provided in the power on behalf of the principal, Minnie Caldwell Brown, notwithstanding later disabilities or mental incompetency of the principal, Minnie Caldwell Brown. All acts done by the attorney in fact pursuant to the power during any period of disability or mental incompetency shall have the same effect and inure to the benefit of and bind the principal or her heirs, devisees, legatees and personal representatives as if the principal, Minnie Caldwell Brown, were mentally competent and not disabled. That the attorney in fact shall have a fiduciary relationship with the principal, Mimie Caldwell Brown, and shall be accountable and responsible as a finduciary.

The appointment of the power of Sara Zelene Caldwell is subject to all of the rules and regulations in all matters set forth under the laws of the State of South Carolina relating to an attorney in fact and specifically Act No. 393 of the Acts for the Laws of the State of South Carolina for 1978 approved the 2nd day of February, 1978, and shall be subject to any subsequent acts passed relating to a Power of Attorney.
