State of South Carolina, Know all men by these presents that I John McDaniel of Greenville District and State aforesaid, for and in consideration of the sum of fifty Dollars to my husband paid by James Vernon of Spartanburgh Dist. and State aforesaid, & Meriman Burns of Greenville district & State aforesaid have granted bargained sold unto the above mentioned James Vernon & Meriman Burns all that tract or parcel of land containing one hundred acres, situated in Greenville district & State aforesaid, on the head of Taylors & Morgans Branch, watered by Enore River, including the spot where the Greenville & Buncombe roads crosses, also where George Culberson formerly lived, the same being a part of a tract of five hundred acres originally granted to Henry Hughes February 5<sup>th</sup> 1784, bounding on John Wheeler, Joseph Morgan, Wm Taylor, Joseph M. Gough
