On Act

To recd certain property to Sarah Pennington, and Jane D. Wilson, widow, at Barton Pennington, late of Greenville County, recently died, intestate, leaving certain property, real & personal, but nothing at law; and also, his natural mother Sarah Pennington and his widowed, natural sister Jane D. Wilson, resided with him during his lifetime at his mother and sister, and were dependent upon him in great part if not altogether for support, and therefore, the said Sarah Pennington and Jane D. Wilson, would be left without adequate support, if they had to surrender said property: Therefore, Section I Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That the State of South Carolina hereby renounces, relinquishes and releases all her right, title, interest and estate, whatsoever may be of, in and to any and all property, real and personal, which she paid at Barton Pennington may have owned at the time of her death, into the said Sarah Pennington and Jane D. Wilson, and their heirs and assigns forever; Provided, that the said Sarah Pennington and Jane D. Wilson, shall within ninety days from and after the approval of this Act pay into the Treasury of the State the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, and when the Treasurer receives thereof, or the entry thereof on the Treasury Books, shall be sufficient evidence of the right, title, interest and estate of the said Sarah Pennington and Jane D. Wilson, hundred of and to the said property.

Section 2. That all Acts, and parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act be and the same are hereby repealed.
