with interest from date at the rate of five (5%) per centum per annum until paid; interest to be computed and paid annually and if unpaid when due to bear interest at same rate as principal until paid, and I have further promised and agreed to pay ten per cent of the whole amount due for attorney's fee, if said note be collected by attorney or through legal proceedings of any kind, reference being thereunto had will more fully appear.

NOW, KNOW ALL MEN, That I, the said Elbert P. Ridgeway,

aforesaid, and for the better securing the payment thereof, according to the terms of the said note, and also in consideration of the further sum of Three Dollars, to me in hand well and truly paid at and before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, sold and released, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and release unto the said Citizens Bank of Fountain Inn, its successors and assigns:

All that piece, parcel or lot of land in Fairview Township, Greenville County, State of South Carolina, on the Jenkins Bridge Road, in Fairview Township, County and State aforesaid, consisting of two (2) parcels, but lying together and constituting a single tract of 292 acres, more or less. Separately the two (2) tracts are described as follows:

A tract of 192 acres, according to a plat made by C. M. Furman, Engineer, February 14, 1927. It begins at a stone on branch at corner of land formerly belonging to the S. E. Harrison estate and J. M. Henderson and runs thence S. 60-30 E. 85.45 to stone on the Jenkins Bridge Road; thence along the road, N. 54-45 E. 12.36 to a stone in road; thence continuing along the road, N. 87 E. 3.72 to stone on tract next described; thence N. 33-30 W. 34.80 to P. O.; thence N. 60-30 W. 11.45 to stone; thence N. 87-30 W. 51.61 to stone on branch; thence up the branch 7.00 to the beginning. Said parcel of land is made up of 2 conveyances, one of which is known as the old Harrison homestead and was conveyed to J. H. Harrison by deed recorded in Book 38, page 572. And owning these lands, J. H. Harrison died intestate leaving as his sole heirs at law, a widow and four (4) children, all of whom are grantors to Elbert P. & Calvin Ridgeway.

The other parcel of land belongs to Maggie L. Harrison and was conveyed to her by Henry Harrison by deed recorded in Book 46, page 47. It adjoins that above described and contains 100 acres, according to a plat made by C. M. Furman, Engineer, in December, 1926. By courses and distances it begins at a R. O. on the corner of lands, now or formerly of J. B. Wasson and M. Henry and runs thence S. 26-45 W. 19.10 to stake; thence S. 23 E. 25.00 to stone; thence S. 44 W. 2.80 to R. O.; thence N. 35-30 W. 37.92 to P. O.; thence N. 63 W. 30.40 to stone; thence N. 24-45 E. 15.20 to beginning corner.
