TO ALL WHOM THESE PRESENTS MAY CONCERN: RICHARD D. THOMAS AND JUDY M. THOMAS

(hereinafter referred to as Mortgagor) SEND(S) GREETING:

(\$ 39,400.00), as evidenced by the Mortgagor's note of even date, bearing interest as stated in said note, and payable as therein stated or as modified by mutual agreement, in writing, the final maturity of which is thirty years after the date hereof, unless extended by mutual consent, the terms of said note and any agreement modifying it are incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the Mortgagor may hereafter become indebted to the said Mortgagee for such further sums as may be advanced or readvanced to or for the Mortgagor's account, including advances made by the Mortgagee on other or no security:

NOW, KNOW ALL MEN, That the Mortgagor, in consideration of the aforesaid debt, and in order to secure the payment thereof and of any other and further sums for which the Mortgagor may be indebted to the Mortgagee at any time for advances made to or for his account by the Mortgagee, and also in consideration of the further sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) to the Mortgagor in hand well and truly paid by the Mortgagee at and before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, has granted, bargained, sold and released, and by these presents does grant, bargain, sell and release unto the Mortgagee, its successors and assigns.

"All that certain piece, parcel or lot of land, with all improvements thereon, or hereafter constructed thereon, situate, lying and being in the State of South Carolina, County of Greenville, being shown as Lot No. 142 on plat of Hillsborough, Section III, said plat being recorded in the R.M.C. office for Greenville County in Plat Book 4N, Page 42, and having, according to said plat, the following metes and bounds, to-wit:

BEGINNING at an iron pin on the eastern side of Winston Court at the joint front corner of Lots 141 and 142 and running thence S. 47-22 E., 159.7 feet to an iron pin at the joint rear corner of Lots 141 and 142; thence running along the common line of Lots 142 and 143 S. 72-10 W., 155 feet to an iron pin on Libby Lane; thence along the side of Libby Lane N. 35-05 W., 113.2 feet to an iron pin at the joint corner of Winston Court and Libby Lane; thence along Winston Court N. 10-57 E., 34.7 feet to an iron pin; thence continuing along Winston Court N. 57-0 E., 35 feet to an iron pin; thence continuing along the curve of Winston Court, the chord of which is N. 80-31 E., 60 feet to an iron pin at the joint front corner of Lots 142 and 141, being the point of beginning.

In addition to and together with the monthly payments of principal and interest under the terms of the Note secured hereby, the mortgagers promise to pay to the mortgagee a monthly premium necessary to carry private mortgage guaranty insurance until the principal balance reaches 80% of the original sales price or appraisal, whichever is less. The estimated monthly premium for the first nine years will be .02% of the original amount of the loan. The estimated monthly premium for each year thereafter will be .01% of the original principal balance of the loan. The mortgagee may advance this premium and collect it as part of the debt secured by the mortgage if the mortgagors fail to pay it.

This is the same property conveyed to the mortgagors by deed of William Ted Dupes and Alice H. Dupes recorded in the R.M.C. Office for Greenville County on July 25, 1977, in Deed Book 1661, Page 122.

Together with all and singular the rights, members, hereditaments, and appurtenances to the same belonging or in any way incident or appertaining, and all of the rents, issues, and profits which may arise or be had therefrom, and including all heating, plumbing, and lighting fixtures and any other equipment or fixtures now or hereafter attached, connected, or fitted thereto in any manner; it being the intention of the parties hereto that all such fixtures and equipment, other than the usual household furniture, be considered a part of the real estate.

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
