

NINTH: The duration of the corporation shall be perpetual.

TENTH: That after due notice, a meeting of the subscribers was held on January 3, 1950, at which a majority of all stock in value being present in person or by proxy, the following were elected directors:

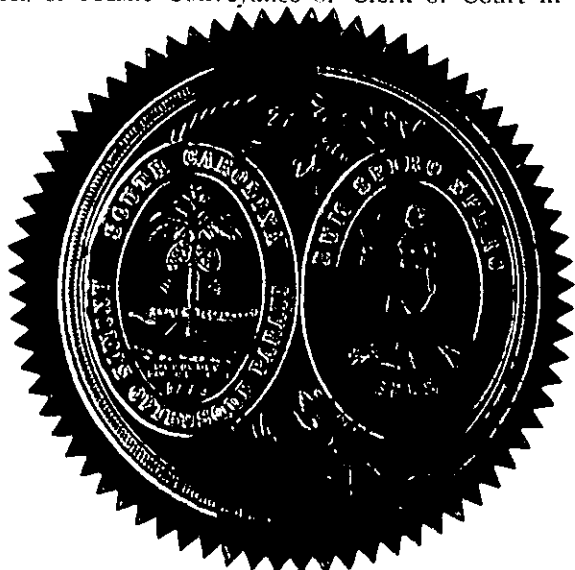

TWELFTH: That all requirements of Article 2, Chapter 153, Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1932, and all amendments thereto have been duly and fully complied with, 50 per cent of the aggregate amount of the capital stock having been subscribed by bona fide subscribers, 20 per cent of the capital stock subscribed having been paid to the Treasurer, and three days' public notice of the intention to file this Declaration with the Secretary of State having been given in The Greenville News , a newspaper published in the County of Greenville, South Carolina.
