COMMUNITY PROFILE

Population

According to the Census 2000, Greenville County's population total 379,616 people, with 83% of the total living in urban areas and 17% living in rural areas. Table 1 shows population shifts of Greenville and South Carolina. Greenville County experienced an 18.6% increase in population from 1990 to 2000, while the City of Greenville declined by 4%. The population of the state of South Carolina experienced an increase of 15.1% from 1990 to 2000. Further, Greenville County is growing at a faster rate than the rest of the state, and is currently the most populated county.



Figure 1 shows the population increase of Greenville County from 1960-2000. This figure shows a trend of steady upward growth over the past 4 decades. According to the Greenville County Planning Commission, this rate of growth is expected to decrease by 2020 (GCRA Plan 10).

Race/Ethnicity

The fastest growing segment of the population is of Hispanic origin, with a growth rate of 371% from 1990 to 2000. People of Hispanic (or Latino) origin make up 3.8% of the Greenville County population, 2.4% of the South Carolina population, and 12.5% ofthe American population (http://factfinder.census.gov/servlet/SAFFFacts? event=Search&geo id=& ge oContext=&_street=&_county=greenville+county&_cityTown=greenville+cou ntv& state=04000US45& zip=& lang=en& sse=on&pctxt=fph&pgsl=010). Additionally, as of 2000, the Greenville Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) is ranked 134th (out of 331 ranked MSA's) nationally for largest Hispanic population (http://mumford.albany.edu/census/HispanicPop/HspSort/ TotHspSort.htm). Meanwhile, Greenville is ranked 11th nationally for fastest Hispanic (http://www.pbs.org/pov/pov2004/farmingville/special hypergrowth.html).

From 1990 to 2000, the Hispanic population of South Carolina increased by 211% and bv the Greenville **MSA** 336% in (http://www.headstartinfo.org/English lang learners tkit/Immigration/region IV/southcarolina.htm#table2). Then, between 2000 and 2002, the Hispanic population of South Carolina grew by 13.6%, while Greenville's Hispanic population grew bv 25% (http://www.pbs.org/pov/pov2004/farmingville/special hypergrowth.html). Despite the rapid growth of the Hispanic population in the U.S., Hispanics are not included as a separate race according to the Census Bureau. That is, when examining race/ethnicity numbers, Hispanics may be included in other race/ethnic groups such as white or black. As of 2000, Whites made up 79% of the total population in Greenville County, while African-Americans made up 18% and all other races represented 3.2% of the remaining population. Figure 2 displays the percentages of all races in the county.




Figure 3: Racial/Ethnic Makeup of Greenville County
